### Application

- In this chapter, we see Paul making clear distinctions between the Godly and the ungodly, between the pure and the sinner. He then gloriously demonstrates how he once was the worst of the ungodly sinner; and through grace and mercy, he was made holy. It is easy to miss this point, but notice that the Lord put him in ministry, not because of his abilities or spiritual skill set, but because He counted Paul *faithful*. How much do you consider ability as prerequisite for service? How much do you consider obedience/faithfulness as prerequisite for service?
- Think of the individual you know who seems least likely to accept Christ, and pray that he/she will have a testimony of God's grace in salvation, as Paul does.
- Pray for faithfulness and obedience to be a permanent characteristic in yourself!
